


Railroad Spike Wizard


I recently took at class at the John C. Campbell Folk School with Steve Williamson entitled "Dragons, Wizards, and Horses" as a NCABANA scholarship recipient and wanted to share how to make a railroad spike wizard head. There are six main steps involved that I will break down over the next little bit but I wanted to list them here for quick reference:

- 1. Flatten the pedestal
- 2. Taper the wizard's hat
- 3. Rough in the face: eye sockets and nose
- Cut in a mustache
- 5. Detail the eyes, beard, mouth, & hat
- 6. Set the hat brim

Step 1: Flatten the pedestal: Start by flattening the bottom of the spike to give a good base for the wizard to stand on.



Step 2: Taper the hat: Draw out the taper to form the wizard's hat.




