Works in Zorn was definitely one of those positive experiences at least from my perspective. The immaculate work spaces and segmented product storage areas were impressive and accompanied by a warm reception from Doug and Natalia Caracelli was appreciated by everyone. Natalia had prepared copious amounts of delicious food and Doug informed us that steaks cooked to order would be available for lunch, just as soon as you finished the made to order tacos for breakfast.

A coal/coke forge with a sidedraft smoke exhaust was lit as well as a double burner Habanero Chile Forge with an extra floor protective shelf (for forge welding). Jerry Achterberg and Doug Caracelli welcomed the Balcones Forge members and special guest blacksmith Frank Lily formerly associated with the TABA organization and it's success. Jesse Stemper announced that Pioneer Farms in Austin with 8 forge setups will be conducting weekend classes. An associate with Blackhawk Mill Works named Bryan would be demonstrating the turning of a peppermill that will also be available for viewing at our next meeting in December. Doug presented one of our youngest member named Owen, with a slightly used anvil and a pair of tongs to the crowds obvious applaud of pleasure.

Joe Travesio was asked to describe the processes needed to forge weld cable into knives or workable billets. Meticulous preparation is very important as well as proper heating and hammering. I had forged a cable knife that was passed around for inspection as well as a smaller every day carry, of which Joe emphasized proper knife sizes depending on the job at hand, be it skinning game or opening a bag of fritos.

After a scrumptious lunch Shane and Aaron went to work on resizing the hardy hole tools I was going to work on for my anvil, and later Joe Travieso forged out some nice forge welded billets for his


Hammer For Sale

An old style 25 LB Little Giant will be rebuilt during the class, but we will also have a new style on hand to demonstrate proper assembly and adjustment of both styles.

The class is held in our shop in historical Nebraska City, Nebraska. Our city has a nice selection of cafes, antique and gift shops, orchards, wineries and museums.

No experience is required to attend this class. Our past classes have been attended

by folks from every walk of life, from students to retirees... anyone who wants to learn can benefit from this class. We approach the rebuilding process using tools that can be found in the average home workshop.

If you are in the market to buy a power hammer, this class will make you an educated shopper. If you already own a Little Giant, or any other brand of power hammer, this class will teach you how to get the best performance possible.

The class costs \$95, refundable up to 7 days prior to the class, advance registration is required. We limit the class to 25 participants. The class starts at 9 AM sharp on Friday, and typically ends by Saturday evening. We are available Sunday until noon in case we encounter any exceptional problems in rebuilding, and to answer remaining questions.

When we receive your registration, we will send you a city map, along with travel and hotel information.

Airports are located in Omaha (45 miles north), Lincoln (50 miles west) and Kansas City (125 miles south).
