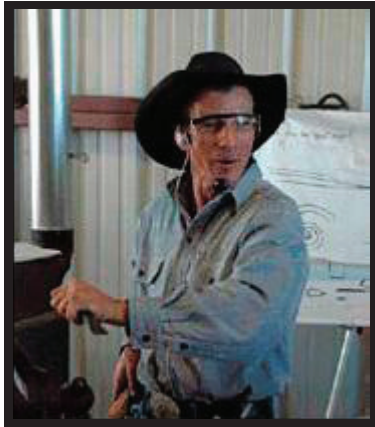

You'll come away with very practical blacksmithing techniques that will expand your skills and creativity.

Our hosts are John and Carolyn Crouchet at their beautiful Sycamore Creek Ranch. **Directions: From Austin:** Hwy 71 northwest to Hwy 281. **From San Antonio:** Hwy 281 north to Marble Falls. Cross the Colorado River into Marble Falls, count 5 stoplights and turn right (east) at Ranch Road 1431. Check your odometer and go 5.6 miles to our gate. As you head out of Marble Falls on 1431, you will notice that you are on a winding, two lane blacktop road with no shoulders. At the top of a long, winding hill, the road changes and suddenly has shoulders. Go fifty yards further and turn left into our driveway between the red reflectors. (Look for the "Anvil" signs.) At our gate, you will see a large oak tree to the left and a small sign to the right that says, "Sycamore Creek Ranch, 5828 East Ranch Road 1431". If the gate is open, just drive on in. If the gate is closed, then there are cattle in this pasture, so please close the gate behind yourself once you enter. Continue on down our driveway for one mile, crossing 4 cattle guards before you see the big metal shop on your left. Welcome! Lost? Call John at 830-798-3710.

ABANA Conference News

December 2009 - Vol. 1 Issue 4

Mark Aspery, Darryl Nelson and Gerald Boggs will be facilitating these Workshops at the "Green Coal" teaching stations during the 2010 Conference in Memphis.

Mark Aspery works with both Darryl Nelson and Gerald Boggs on a regular basis, teaching twice a year at Darryl's school in Washington State and teaching with Gerald at some of the craft schools in the Eastern States on a somewhat regular basis.

Gerald will be handling the fundamentals classes and Darryl will be running the advanced classes. Mark Aspery will be manning the intermediate section with a basic forge welding class and a tool-making class.

Gerald's class will explore the basic tenets of blacksmithing using leaf-making as a vehicle. Hammers, hammer swings and types of blow along with tapers and spreading will get you well on your way as a beginning smith. Gerald's attention to detail and a seemingly unending supply of patience and a healthy sense of humor will be a boon to the new smith in this class.

Darryl will focus on two-dimensional animal heads and the related tooling for his classes. The steps used to complete an animal head in 2D are very similar to Darryl's 3D heads but are a little easier to complete given the time frame that we will be operating within. Darryl will be showing the larger three-dimensional heads during his demonstration at the conference.

Mark Aspery will be looking at forge-welding in the gas forge making a flux spoon and a BBQ fork for his first class and tool making for his second class. The tool-making class will focus on a section of his tool-making demonstration given during the conference. This will give some smiths a chance to try their hand at some of the things they may have seen at the demo.

If we have time, Mark might try to fit in an evening talk about basic heat treatment and offer a practical demonstration for those interested.

ABANA has arranged to borrow 'BAM's' well-provisioned equipment trailer to make up a section of the teaching station, along with the existing ABANA equipment the teaching area will be much larger than any past conference.

Many thanks to the BAM Board of Directors! We should have a mix of gas and coal forges and upwards of a dozen anvils at the teaching station.

Don't forget to bring your personal safety equipment if you would like to participate in the classes. We are planning to have some seating available at the teaching station for those that prefer to watch but not participate.

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Happy New Year!

Being the New Year, and keeping in line with the time-honored tradition of New Year's resolutions, I would like to share with everyone how ABANA is focusing our attention on our affiliates and membership. Below I have listed a few points of interest regarding publicity, participation, and prosperity within our organization.

1. We want to give our affiliates more coverage, both on the internet and in our publications. So, here are two FREE things you can do to spread your affiliate out to the masses:
 - A. ABANA website: There are a couple of things the ABANA website can do for you other than simply having your affiliate information listed. We want to know what you are doing! Send us the dates and general information of your events so we can add them to the Events Calendar.
There is also banner space available at the top of the website. This is for you to advertise your hammer-ins, conferences and bigger events to anyone and everyone who visits the website. All you need to do is create a banner to meet these requirements to put yours into rotation with the others –390 x 57 pixels as either a jpg or gif file – and we will get it going. Try not to put too much in the ad – just enough to get the attention of the visitor to click on the ad! Please make sure you also send along a link to attach to the banner so people can be directed to your website for more information!
 - B. I want to ask each of you to write an article about YOUR organization. It can be on anything your affiliate would like to share with us. Here are some example topics:
 1. History of the guild
 2. Veteran member recognition/special award presentation
 3. Meeting place (some of you meet at historical villages, etc.)
 4. Meeting or Special event
 5. Community service projects
 6. How-To (anything on planning an event to projects, tips, etc.)
 7. Group projects
 8. Anything else you can think of!!

I am also on the Publications and Internet Committees, so contact me with your events to be posted, banners to be added, and articles to be published!!!

2. The time is NOW to start planning for the 2010 ABANA Conference in Memphis. There are a few things that are being done specifically for the affiliates:
 - A. There will actually be three ring projects! These rings can be submitted by individuals or groups. This is a great opportunity to get together and make something great. (...and possibly even write an article on it too!) Please see the attached pages for more ring instructions and info. Something new for this year is that the proceeds will be split 50/50 with participating affiliates. This means that this great tradition is now a fundraiser for everyone involved!

- B. There will be a designated area in the gallery for YOU to display your banners and forged banner stands. If you do not have one yet, then get busy planning a group project to make one.
 - C. There will also be free vendor space for the affiliates. You may use this area to set up an informational table so that others may learn more about your organization. The space is free, but you will have to pay for electrical plug-ins and table/chair rental if you do not bring your own. Selling of merchandise is prohibited unless you file for a vendor license. This is indoor space, so there is no worry of weather getting in the way of your display! The vendor area is also open to the public, so you will be able to get some exposure to the general public as well as fellow blacksmiths.
 - D. It is also not too late to sponsor an area, demonstrator, etc. at the conference. There are still a number of things that need sponsorship. So far the following affiliates have stepped up: Louisiana Metalsmiths Association, The Blacksmith Guild of Virginia, Balcones Forge, Mid-Atlantic Smiths Association, California Blacksmith Association, Saltfork Craftsmen, Guild of Metalsmiths, Central Virginia Blacksmith Guild and Dakota Artist Blacksmith Association. How about you? There are sponsorship opportunities still for demonstrators, support crews, gallery, and more ranging from \$500.00 up to \$1,500.00. Those who are sponsoring parts of the conference will have signs posted for all to know who is helping make it a great conference!
 - E. The daily Iron in the Hat drawings are going to be for donated tools and items. This is also a GREAT place for the affiliates to get involved!
3. There is a need to revitalize the ABANA Affiliate Liaison program to become something that can serve everyone involved. To date, the Liaison program has been a more or less one way street that allows ABANA an avenue to disseminate information. I think it is time to allow ideas and discussion flow not only back to ABANA, but directly with other affiliates as well. What I want to do is create a blog for the liaisons to "meet" and discuss any ideas and/or issues, ask questions, give advice, or communicate anything else that may be helpful to others. For ABANA to become a better organization, we need a direct link to our members and affiliates. Choosing the liaison is completely up to the individual affiliate. Ring Project Info:

THE THREE THEMES ARE:

National Ornamental Metal Museum

The rings and framework of this piece will acknowledge the important presence of the National Ornamental Metal Museum in Memphis, Tennessee and classical ornamental metal work in general. Ring submissions might draw their inspiration from American or European mastersmiths.

Mississippi River

These rings will acknowledge the importance of the Mississippi River from the headwaters of Lake Itasca in northern Minnesota to the Mississippi River delta in New Orleans. Rings might include flora, fauna, fish, birds, boats, river towns, and history associated with the river.

Memphis Music

These rings will acknowledge the Memphis music scene. Rings might reference musicians (Elvis Presley), music (Beale Street blues), instruments (Gibson guitars), etc.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this undertaking is to promote friendly competition for blacksmiths and metalsmiths, to raise revenue for ABANA, and for fun and camaraderie.

CALL FOR RINGS

Anyone interested in submitting a ring (or rings) is encouraged to make and send his or her best work for possible inclusion into one of the frameworks.

Commitments are requested by November 30, 2009; however all rings are welcome at the ABANA conference. Rings must be handed in by noon June 3, 2010. Rings received before the conference may be used for photo opportunities advertising the conference, a great incentive to contact the project coordinator and get those rings in early!

SPECIFICATIONS FOR MAKING THE RINGS

- Ring size is 10" O.D. (outside diameter, and must be accurate) made from ¼" x 1" steel flat stock bent the hard way.
- Each ring needs space left at the 12 o'clock, 3 o'clock, 6 o'clock, and 9 o'clock positions with a minimum of 5 minutes (using the clock analogy) on either side of these positions for mounting. Refer to the sketch below.
- Materials inside the ring can be ferrous or nonferrous metals.
- All rings are offset from the framework 1/2" (ring construction cannot protrude greater than 1/2" towards the back side).

Selection will be based on: interpretation of theme, quality of execution using traditional forging techniques (chiseling, forge welds, rivet joinery etc.), and meeting specifications.

Twelve rings will be selected, four for each theme, from all the rings submitted.

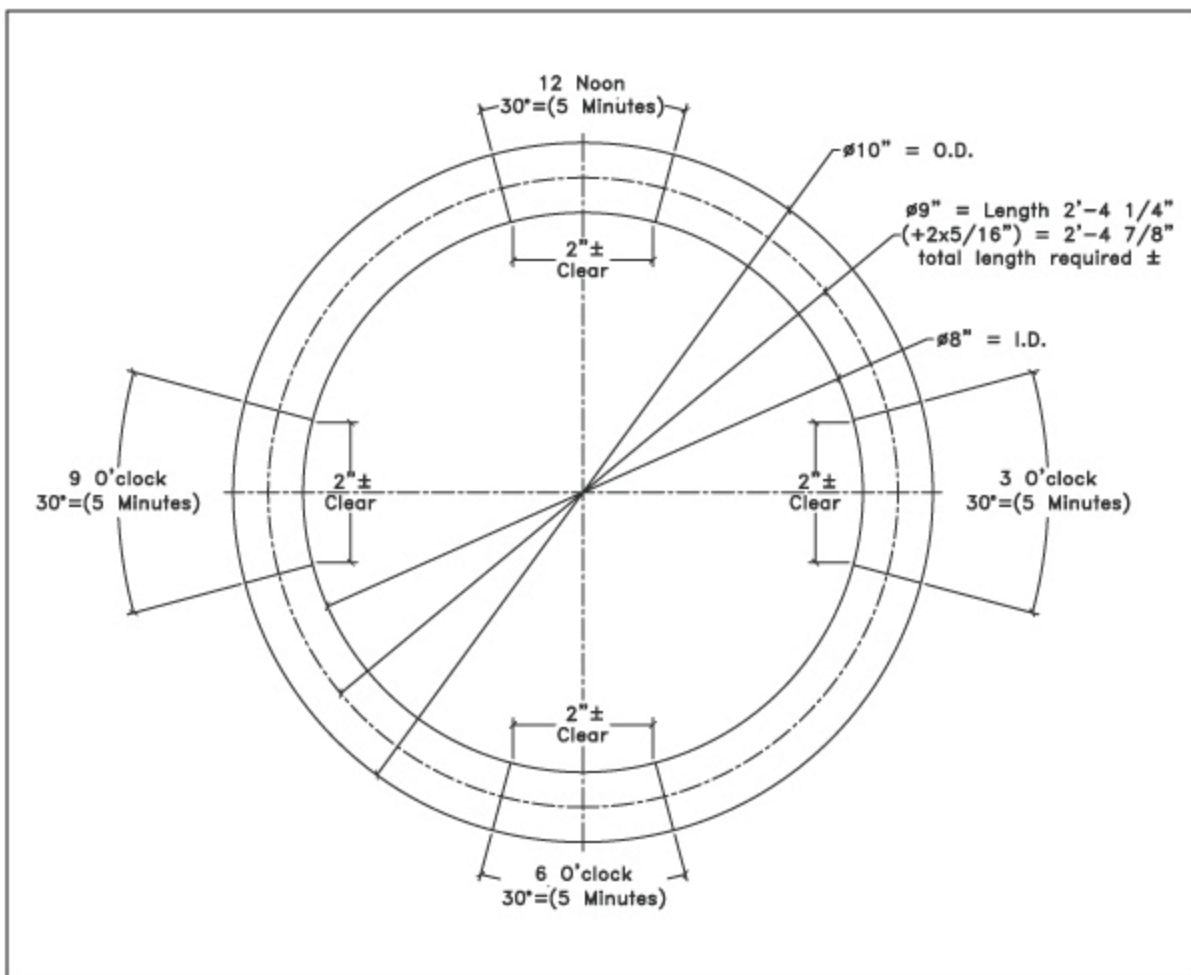
The funds raised from the ABANA 2010 Ring Project will help offset conference costs and support the educational mission of ABANA, grants, scholarships to individuals, and special projects of an educational nature. Those ring makers whose rings are selected for one of the three frameworks will receive 50% of the net auction proceeds. All other rings not selected for the project will be auctioned individually and the maker will receive 50% of the proceeds.
