It's shocking how much money it takes to put on a major demo. Lots and lots of money! Thousands of dollars! And yet, Balcones Forge does it year after year. This year will mark our thirteenth major blacksmithing demo and we have managed to pay the bills every year!

How do we do it? One simple truth......Everybody pitches in and helps. Every year, our members step up. There is no other way. The costs are just too great for a few people to pay the bill. We hire absolutely the finest blacksmithing talent we can find for our demos. We fly them to Texas and fly them home. We pay all their expenses. We buy iron, coal, tools, food, drinks, and we pay hundreds of dollars for things you might not even think of, like porta potties and table and chair rentals. It really adds up!

So where does the big dough come from? Not from demo admission fees! They never add up to enough to write the big checks! The thing that puts us over the top every time is **THE AUCTION!!! Each and every time, the auction pays the bills!**

Start early, work hard, and bring something to contribute!

Of course, all those fancy auction items need to go to a good home, so bring a little extra money and take home a new hammer or a nice pair of tongs. Together, we will manage to pay the bills one more time and next year we will proudly put on our fourteenth Balcones Forge Big Demo! Our hosts are John and Carolyn Crouchet at their beautiful Sycamore Creek Ranch. **Directions: From Austin:** Hwy 71 northwest to Hwy 281. **From San Antonio:** Hwy 281 north to Marble Falls. Cross the Colorado River into Marble Falls, count 5 stoplights and turn right (east) at Ranch Road 1431. Check your odometer and go 5.6 miles to our gate. As you head out of Marble Falls on 1431, you will notice that you are on a winding, two lane blacktop road with no shoulders. At the top of a long, winding hill, the road changes and suddenly has shoulders. Go fifty yards further -- you'll see white stripes on the roadway. Also look for the "Anvil" signs. At our gate, you will see a large oak tree to the left and a small sign to the right that says, "Sycamore Creek Ranch, 5828 East Ranch Road 1431." If the gate is open, just drive on in. If the gate is closed, then there are cattle in this pasture, so please close the gate behind you once you enter. ## LEARN HOW TO MAKE YOUR LITTLE GIANT POWER HAMMER WORK HARDER THAN EVER!

Please join us March 22-24, 2013 for our annual Little Giant Rebuilding Seminar!

This class was first taught by our good friend Fred Caylor of Zionsville, Indiana. We carry on his tradition of teaching people how to make Little Giants run well and hit hard.

This 2 ½ day class is a hands-on format. You will help transform a 25 LB Little Giant hammer from functional but sloppy condition into a well tuned, quiet, hard working hammer. Sid Suedmeier, owner of Little Giant, will share all his knowledge and experience gained from working with Fred and from 20+ years of repairing and rebuilding Little Giants.

An old style 25 LB Little Giant will be rebuilt during the class, and a new style machine will be on hand to demonstrate proper assembly and adjustment of both styles. All information applies to all sizes of Little Giants.

The class is held in our shop in historical Nebraska City, Nebraska. The city has a wide variety of cafes, outlets (including Pendleton Woolen Mills), antique and gift shops, orchards and museums. Friday night a tour of the Kregel Windmill Museum is open to all class participants. Learn more about this at KregelWindmillMuseum.org.

#### IF YOU HAVE A LITTLE GIANT, THIS CLASS IS FOR YOU!

No experience is required to attend this class. Past students have ranged from age 15 to 90, and from all walks of life. Anyone who wants to learn will benefit from this class. We approach the rebuilding process using tools that can be found in the average home workshop.

If you are in the market to buy a power hammer, this class will make you an educated shopper. If you already own a Little Giant, or any other brand of power hammer, this class will teach you how to get the best performance possible.

The class costs \$95, refundable up to 7 days prior to the class; advance registration is

required. We limit the class to 25 participants. The class starts at 9 AM sharp on <u>Friday</u>, and usually ends by Saturday evening. The schedule runs Sunday until noon in case we encounter any exceptional problems in rebuilding, and to answer remaining questions. The last 2 years the class has filled up by the end of January.

When we receive your registration, we will send you a city map, along with travel and hotel information.

Airports are located in Omaha (45 miles north), Lincoln (50 miles west) and Kansas City (125 miles south).


