SECRETARY'S REPORT

The December 2006 Balcones Forge meeting was a good one. It was at Gary Evensen's shop in Lakeway and we had at least 37 people attend, which is great for a holiday weekend. The meeting was full this time, as we had everything from show & tell to iron-in-the-hat, trade items and a work shop...all topped off with a great Dutch oven lunch.

So...to begin with, Dave Koenig, all the way from Houston, showed us some cool napkin rings/ wine bottle bling (whichever folks are buying!) that he made from 1/4" tin-coated copper wire he found in the scrap yard. They had a really nice color to them, being a copper color softened by a hint of tin to lighten them up. He also brought some chased vessels made of 14 gauge sheet metal and a forged aluminum spoon and leaf that will become his kinetic sculpture trade item.

Because we planned a tong-making workshop for the day's main event, we went ahead with ironin-the-hat and the trade items early. I'd like to remind everyone that iron-in-the-hat is a great way to bring in a little extra change to the group for demos and is a good way to clean out your shop at the same time. So...if you have blacksmithing related items you'd like to get rid of and want to donate them to Balcones Forge...bring them on in!! This month, we had an black glass store front panel (1" thick) from 1876 that will make a good table top, some 1084 steel shot, a box jaw tong kit, a cold cut, a 2 1/4" x 53 1/2" steel bar ("large" cross kit), an unused cardboard milk jug cap, a 5lb can of coffee, and a 2006 ABANA T-shirt. We also had seven trade items. This month's theme was something kinetic and boy did we have some good moving pieces come out of the challenge. Keep in mind that if you make an item to trade, you get to take home someone else's interpretation of that item and we are such a clever bunch

of folks. You don't want to miss out. It also gives you the opportunity to practice making things you may not otherwise think about making.

For the meeting, Gary Hilton came all the way from Hunt to show us how to make box-jaw tongs. Cut stock was provided for everyone who wanted to make a pair and there were lots of takers. There was a nice procedure board on which tongs at each step in the forging process were displayed. Then, Gary H. forged one half of a set of tongs for folks to see how it was done in person. Afterwards, with the power hammer going, three anvils and two forges set up...folks got busy.



LEARN HOW TO MAKE YOUR LITTLE GIANT POWER HAMMER WORK HARDER THAN EVER!

Please join us for the 15th annual Little Giant Rebuilding Seminar! We will host 2 classes, Friday, March 16 through Sunday, March 18 or Friday, March 23 through Sunday the 25th, 2007.

This class was first taught by our good friend Fred Caylor of Zionsville, Indiana. We carry on his tradition of teaching how to make Little Giants run well and hit hard.

Each 2 ¹/₂ day class is a hands-on format. You will help transform a 25 LB Little Giant hammer from functional but sloppy condition into a well tuned, quiet, hard working hammer. Sid Suedmeier, owner of Little Giant, will share all his knowledge and experience gained from working with Fred and from 16 years of repairing and rebuilding Little Giants.

An old style 25 LB Little Giant will be rebuilt during each class, and a new style machine will be on hand to demonstrate proper assembly and adjustment of both styles.

The classes are held in our shop in historical Nebraska City, Nebraska. The city has a wide variety of cafes, outlets (including Pendleton Woolen Mills), antique and gift shops, orchards, wineries and museums.

IF YOU HAVE A LITTLE GIANT, THIS CLASS IS FOR YOU!

No experience is required to attend this class. Past classes have been comprised of students, retirees, artists, welders, doctors, farriers ...anyone who wants to learn will benefit from this class. We approach the rebuilding process using tools that can be found in the average home workshop.

If you are in the market to buy a power hammer, this class will make you an educated shopper. If you already own a Little Giant, or any other brand of power hammer, this class will teach you how to get the best performance possible.

The class costs \$95, refundable up to 7 days prior to the class; advance registration is required. We limit each class to 25 participants. The classes start at 9 AM sharp on Friday, and usually end by Saturday evening. The schedule runs Sunday until noon in case we encounter any exceptional problems in

rebuilding, and to answer remaining questions.

When we receive your registration, we will send you a city map, along with travel and hotel information.

Airports are located in Omaha (45 miles north), Lincoln (50 miles west) and Kansas City (125 miles south).


