Greetings!

We can only hope that winter is behind us, but don't count on it. We will probably see some more cool weather before we see spring, and then a week or two later we will ease into summer. You will know its spring when all the things that "sting" show

up. Besides the mosquitoes, the hornets and the yellow jackets, I hate the fire ants most of all. These bullies of the back yard like to hide in the grass and wait until you are covered with them before they start to sting. Then it's too late and you can't get them off fast enough.

I hate bug sprays and chemicals so I keep ant can near the forge, which is a 3 pound coffee can with a bail on it. I fill it half full of water and heat it in the forge when I see ant mounds in the yard. Once the water is boiling I just pour it over the mound and get some more water for the next mound. It kills them instantly (along with some of the grass, but it will be ok in a day or two) and leaves no residue.

I once had thousands of ants invade the river house after a sudden spring shower. The shop vac had them cleaned up in just a few minutes. I also put diatomaceous earth, which is a very fine powder, around the perimeter of the house and out buildings. It works all bugs with an exoskeleton by getting between their body joints and scratching them to death.

Lastly when the ants have invaded your shop and you don't have the shop vac handy, use that little propane torch to stop them in their tracks. Those trails of ants are stopped instantly and you don't have to put up with that ant killer order (besides that, it's kind of fun).



Several methods for reaching the end result for a unique set of door hinges. A very helpful jig for bending the hinge point was explained and demonstrated, as well as how to form the bolt loop by hand. It was evident that these two blacksmiths had performed this task numerous times because the end results of several pairs of hinges were forged exceptionally well.

Before the auction began, Jerry Achterberg called a Balcones Board members meeting to order. Always trying to be proactive in the future for Balcones Forge, Alan Lee started submitting names for next year's Bluebonnet demonstrators. Several names were thrown into the hat for consideration and it was determined that the board will discuss these suggestions, as well as consideration for what members want and decisions will be announced at a later date.

It was very interesting to watch similar techniques to present such different and functional pieces. It was a lively presentation, to say the least; very informative and enjoyable.

The iron smelt according to Alan was running a little behind. The process is as much a learning process each time it is undertaken. Nevertheless, by overcoming unexpected problems that the group experienced, they were successful in smelting a bloom. It is noteworthy to mention, that those individuals have little opportunity to participate in any other event, except to devote their full attention to the smelt. Admirable devotion!

Condolences to our good friend, James Honig

Janet "Janie" Honig, age 76, of Hondo passed away Monday, Jan. 19, 2015, after a battle with cancer.

Janie was born May 14, 1938, in Louisville, KY, the daughter of Benjamin and Mary Loring Potter and grew up on the family farm in Connecticut. She graduated from Plainfield High School and completed the Baccus Hospital nursing program.

She joined the U.S. Air Force in 1962 as a registered nurse and served in Thailand, Germany and at various locations in the United States.

While stationed in San Antonio, she met James Honig at a square dance in Hondo and they were married Dec. 28, 1974. She continued her education, earning a Master's degree in Nursing from Incarnate Word College. James worked at his welding shop in Hondo.

Janie was stationed in Thailand as a nurse during "Operation Freedom", transporting Thai and Vietnamese refugees to the Philippine Islands. She was the RN on the C-141 transport planes.

Later, she was stationed at Del Rio. James commuted while she was the charge nurse in labor and delivery. She helped pioneer many programs, such as fathers in the delivery room and older children being allowed to visit their new siblings, which were instituted worldwide by the Air Force.

At Wilford Hall, Janie was in charge of labor and delivery, in charge of eight wards and more than 300 staff. At Moody AFB, GA, she was the base hospital's, chief nurse.

After 20 years service, in 1982 she retired with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. She then worked as chief nurse of Air Force Village II for 12 years. Her nursing career spanned more than 50 years.

In retirement she continued to help people, looking after James' aunt Anita, his mother and father, her aunt Ruth, and her cousin Francis for 18 months. Her nursing skills were of great help.

Janie enjoyed helping James in the shop and even learned how to weld. They enjoyed being together, She also helped with haying, working the cattle and the dogs.

She was an excellent quilter, making many quilts for the nieces and nephews, which they all treasure. Her last quilt was made with James' mother, Leona, as a wedding gift for nephew Keith and Jennifer Honig. It was signed: Leona Honig, age 100, Janie Honig, age 76.

Janie loved her church. She worked with the Altar Guild and cleaned the church and fellowship hall for many years.

She was courageous in her battle with cancer. She never lost her faith in God and knew He was with her through all the surgeries.

Janie was preceded in death by her parents; her father-in-law, William Honig; brother-in-law, Emanuel Honig; and her cousin, Francis Anton.

Survivors are her husband of 40 years, James Honig; mother-in-law, Leona Honig of Hondo; brothers-in-law and sisters-in-law, Paul and Faye Honig of San Antonio, Weldon and Marilyn Honig of Kenedy and Carol Honig of Las Alamos NM; and numerous nieces and nephews.



Randy McDaniel Demonstration

Randy did a lot of character forms. I'm going to describe what he called his simple dragon. He did a more elaborate dragon later when I was elsewhere.

Use half face blows to establish the transition between the nose and the head.



A hollow eye punch is used to make the eyes and sockets.



A ball punch is used to make the nostrils.



A straight chisel is used to open up the mouth, make it pretty deep.



Use another chisel to make the teeth.



The ears are lifted up with a chisel. And then shaped with a ball punch.

The back of the neck is tapered to start the scales.

The scale affect was achieved by working the back of the neck over the edge of the anvil.

Finally the head is positioned using bending forks.
